# Read Luke 23:32-43.

1. Jesus' mission was to seek and save the lost [Luke 19:10]. How did Jesus live this out in His life? In His death? In your life?

2. Read Isaiah 53:12. It was no accident that Jesus was crucified between two thieves. Why was it necessary to God that Jesus be "numbered with the transgressors"?

4. Romans 10:9-10 assures us that salvation is an instantaneously free and undeserved gift. This is what the thief received from Jesus. Why, then, do many people strive to be good enough for God to save them?

5. Read Acts 7:59; 2 Corinthians 5:8; and Philippians 1:23. What do these verses tell us about what happens after we die? How does this encourage and give you hope?

6. The thief simply asked Jesus to remember him when He came into His kingdom. How did Jesus give him exceedingly abundantly above all he could have ever asked or imagined?
