Getting Started:

1. Have you ever been in a house threatened by a natural disaster? What happened?

Digging Deeper:

Read Matthew 7:1-6

1. This chapter continues to reveal the attitudes and actions "kingdom people" are to have. What connection is Jesus making between the faults we notice in others and our own problems?

2. What is Jesus stressing about God in this passage?

3. The word Jesus used for judge can be translated to avenge, conclude, or condemn. In what ways can we judge in this way? How can we stop, as Jesus tells us to stop?

4. A healthy sense of judgment is caring enough to confront a Christian brother or sister who is caught in a transgression or sin. Read Galatians 6:1-5. How are we to judge and confront fellow believers in a way that seeks their good?

5. Consider the illustration Jesus gives about a plank in our own eyes. How can we yank that plank from our lives?
